What Do Altars Mean For Us?

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the final article in a series about the history of Altar Arts and what it means to us in today's church.)

Altars are a memorial of the places where God meets us. We may not always be able to make a physical altar, but there can be one established in our hearts. When we celebrate communion, we are celebrating the grandest altar of all, the Cross of Calvary. The Son of God was the ultimate sacrifice, and his work on the Cross reconciled all humankind to God, made possible for our lives to be infused with meaning, for our sins to be forgiven and to give us the promise of eternal life." (Jack Hayford)

After Jesus made the ultimate sacrifice, sacrificial altars as used in the Old Testament were no longer deemed necessary. Altars became the place where we could meet, remember, and honor God. Pastor Jack Hayford writes that God has a place of 'altaring' for us – a place of 'altaring' and a price of 'altaring'. When we come to the altar, God intends that something be altered in us. That is the price. To receive the promise, we must make way for the transformation. We must be willing to accept that God's plan for us may not look the way we thought it would. We must acknowledge that God's love for us is also his promise to care for us, to help us grow, and to help us live up to the promise of the ultimate sacrifice.

Hayford writes that what it takes to build an altar "are rocks, broken things. The geological application is relevant, there are volcanic explosions in our lives, seismic events, the grinding of life. You can take hard things and arrange them before the Lord or you can drag the rocks around and be burdened by them. Or when you're frustrated at lugging them around, you get mad and throw them at somebody else. The way you build an altar is to bring those hard, broken things before the Lord and put them there. The price of 'altaring' is that you have to pour your life out over it, saying "Lord I come and present myself to You! At the altar, the price is paid for renewal when we've been at a distance, for securing hope we may have thought was lost and for receiving promise, even if it's in an unpleasant environment. Come to the ultimate altar and receive the ultimate promise and provision made offered in our Lord Jesus Christ."

So we've learned how altars came to be, what they meant for the early church, and what they mean as reflected in Jesus' ultimate sacrifice for us. But what now? What does our church do about altars? Let's find out.

How Does Conway FUMC Altar?

At Conway FUMC, there is an altar in each of our three worship spaces: the Chapel, the Sanctuary, and the Great Hall in the Trinity Building.

The Chapel, situated in the Trinity Building and accessed from the north side of the lobby, is an intimate space for worship and, for many, a quiet refuge for prayer. For our college students, the Chapel is home to their weekly Wednesday evening Campus Ministry Worship Services. The Chapel altar is simple, lit from behind by the Holy Spirit window.

The altar in the Sanctuary is located in the Chancel behind the communion rail and below the pulpit. Here, with pulpit above

altar table below, we experience visibly the relationship between Word and Sacrament every time we worship or visit during the day for personal prayer and meditation. The baptismal font is also located in a Chancel, which, even when not in use, stands as a constant reminder of our Baptismal Covenant and our inclusion in the family of God.

Because the Great Hall is a multi-use space, there is no fixed altar here nor is there a permanent Chancel. For worship services in the Great Hall, the Altar Arts team create an environment, or altarscape, which transforms the room from an ordinary gathering place into a Sanctuary with the focal point being the altar, by means of directed lighting and the inclusion not only of a portable altar table, but also of various seasonal displays and banners with symbolism corresponding to the liturgical and Scriptural themes of the Service.

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Altar Arts and Altar Guild — how can I help?

At Conway FUMC, there are plenty of opportunities to serve with fellow parishioners to prepare our various worship spaces for celebrations of Word and Sacrament.

The Altar Guilds

The Altar Guild for Services in the Great Hall chiefly prepare the Table for the celebration of Holy Communion, setting out the communionware with the loaves and chalices of unfermented wine. The Sanctuary Altar Guild care for and curate the adornments of the altar (the altar lamps, the cross, the Book of Scripture, and the like) and keep and place the paraments and fair linens used atop the altar seasonally.

The Altar Arts Teams

The Altar Arts team for services in the Great Hall transform the ordinary into the extraordinary. Using fabric, platforms of all kinds and sizes, greenery, flowers, candles, canvasses, crosses, and glass pieces, they have portrayed lakeshores, the journey of Magi, the Nativity, and countless other Scriptural scenes and themes.

Whereas Great Hall Altar Arts must create an environment from a hard space, the Sanctuary Altar Arts Team augments the naturally existing architecture of worship with additional creative focal points that heighten awareness of liturgical and Scriptural themes, both seasonal and weekly. Along with the Altar

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Guild, they create seasonal banners used both for fixed display and as part of festive processions at the start and close of Services. Altar Arts Sanctuary displays may appear adjacent the altar, on the Chancel stairs, or even hang from within our soaring dome.

Both the Sanctuary and Great Hall Altar Guilds, as the well as the Altar Arts Teams who serve in both of these spaces, are made up of volunteers who collaborate directly with our worship shaping committees.

All four of these teams are always seeking new members eager to help with "altaring"! These are unique areas of ministry — service not only to our Lord, the People of God, but also to the Liturgy itself. In serving at the altar in any capacity, either during the service or in preparation for it is an act of worship, a sacrifice of praise. Please prayerfully consider serving!
